## How to find an internship:

- Your College/University: Talk to your school's Office of Career Services for internships opportunities. If you are applying for a summer internship, it is never too early to get started on the application process.
- <u>Internships.com</u>: is a comprehensive internship search engine. Narrow down opportunities according to your major, field of interest, location and desired company.
- <u>Idealist.org</u>: is a great site for non-profit internships.
- <u>Simplyhired.com</u>: compiles internship listings from many sites and allows you to sort by keyword, industry and location.
- Research Companies which have specific programs for hiring veteran interns. Some of your favorite companies may have veterans initiatives.

## Tips to enhance your internship search:

- The sooner you start, the better! Don't wait until the end of the school year to start thinking about summer internships, start early.
